Central Kansas Community Foundation is a not for profit, 501 (c) (3) charitable entity based in Newton, Kansas. CKCF holds a permanent collection of funds designed to link donors with charitable causes. The CKCF promotes and supports charitable giving by assisting individuals, families and organizations in the creation of charitable funds; building resources to provide for unmet community needs; making grants to charitable causes and providing a platform for long-term charitable initiatives that focus on building stronger communities.

Together with donors, the Foundation works to enhance all areas of life including, but not limited to, education, environment, civic and human services, health care and the arts.

The Central Kansas Community Foundation was incorporated in 1995 and has grown in assets to more than \$19 million. The Foundation presently manages more than 350 funds including scholarships, donor advised funds, designated funds, unrestricted funds and organizational endowments.

The Foundation also has 19 affiliate foundations that include three non-community and 16 community Foundations.

The Foundation is proud of making a significant community impact by granting more than \$16 million since its inception.

CASA: A Voice FOR Children

COMMUNITY Impact

Among many other significant improvements in the lives of children with a CASA volunteer present in their lives, more that 90% of children with CASA volunteer will never reenter the child welfare system. This is a significant difference compared to the general foster care population.

MARY'S STORY

Mary is a 14 year old who has been in and out of foster care since she was 6, primarily due to her father's substance abuse issues and unstable life style. Her mother died when she was a baby. A CASA volunteer was appointed for Mary and was a constant person in her life for over a year and a half. The CASA volunteer advocated for Mary to have exposure to educational opportunities beyond high school and for her future.

When Mary's father relinquished his parental rights Mary expressed interest in being adopted by her foster parents whom she had lived with on and off while she was in foster care. The CASA volunteer expressed Mary's wishes to the judge as well as the CASA's observation of the bond between Mary and foster parents. This information assisted the judge and caseworker in making an informed decision. The adoption was finalized before Christmas and Mary was able to celebrate the holiday season with her forever home.

The same volunteer stays on the case until the child is placed in a safe permanent home. The local CASA organization serves Harvey and McPherson Counties.

Girl Scouts **OF** Kansas Heartland

COMMUNITY Impact

Community service is an integral part of the GSLE. Through community service, girls contribute to the improvement of society through their abilities, leadership skills, and cooperation with others. In 2015, girls in Newton completed community service projects such as collecting reusable bags to distribute in the community to decrease the use of plastic shopping bags and volunteering as bell ringers for Salvation Army during the holidays.

An April 2012 study released by the Girl Scout Research Institute, Girl Scouting Works: The Alumnae Impact Study, examined the long-term impact and effect of Girl Scouting by comparing Girl Scout alumnae and non-alumnae on several indicators of success. Results concluded that when compared to non-alumnae, Girl Scout alumnae display significantly more positive life outcomes on several indicators of success, including: sense of self, achievement of life goals, leadership, volunteerism and community work, civic engagement, education, and income/socioeconomic status.

A nationwide Big Brothers Big Sisters study found that one-to-one relationships are the driving force behind the impact on children, with long-lasting effects on children's confidence, grades and social skills. The study found the BBBS "LITTLES" are

46% less likely to begin using illegal drugs 27% less likely to use alcohol 52% less likely to skip school

By creating Heart to Heart, children who had been abused can come to a center that is child friendly, with resources available for the child and the child's non-offending family. Heart to Heart relies on a multidisciplinary response to child abuse which includes law enforcement, child protective services, mental health providers, and school staff. Instead of numerous interviews by various agencies, those agencies joined in a team effort, so the child would be interviewed by only one person. It is the goal of Heart to Heart to provide the necessary services, resources and compassion for children and the families who come to the center reporting abuse.

Each year, Heart to Heart serves 130-160 children in Harvey, Marion, and McPherson Counties. Approximately 2/3 of that number is Harvey County alone. In addition to serving children and their non-offending caregivers, we provide community outreach to provide education about preventing child abuse, mandated reporting, etc.


