Barkman's answer the call to give, and they gave big. In 2021 they requested a gift of \$480,000 be distributed to MidAmerica Nazarene University from their donor advised fund, the Brent and Brenda Barkman Charitable Family Fund, held at Hillsboro Community Foundation, an affiliate of Central Kansas Community Foundation.

The Bright Futures campaign includes the new, state-of-the-art 50,000- square-foot Cunningham Student Center. This new center is replacing the nearly 50-year-old Campus Center building. The center features multi-use spaces for meeting, a larger, enhanced dining area, outdoor areas, a fitness center and the campus store. The second-floor houses Enrollment Development, Student Financial Aid Services and Student Development with space specifically designed for visiting prospective students and their families.

The special link for the Barkman's is a family history on campus that led to the opportunity to fund the Hight Student Activity Center that is nestled within the Cunningham Student Center. This is named after Lynette's parents Kendall and Sharron Hight. The family

connection to the campus is four generations long a has included many family members attending and graduating from MNU and is what means so much and has led to giving a gift of love that will be treasured for generations to come.

Brent and Lynette met at the University and wed in 1983, they have 2 children and 5 grandchildren.

Bright Futures: the campaign for MidAmerica Nazarene University is a three-priority, multi-year campaign for \$61 million. The current phase of the campaign is an athletic complex that will enhance the experience of all students and athletes who choose to attend MNU. It is fully underway, and funding is being requested from anyone who is interested in investing in the future of young people in a great Christ centered environment. "God has blessed us incredibly and now is the time to bless others is our philosophy" says Brent.



In September of 2021, a fund was created with the Remington Area Community Foundation to service families in the Remington area by offering registrations to Dolly Parton's Imagination Library for families who reside in the following zip codes: 67154, 67123, & 67401.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library puts books into the hands and hearts of children across the world. They partner with local communities to provide a hand-selected, age-appropriate, high-quality book each month to registered children from birth to age five.

So far, over \$6,000 has been donated to the fund and \$400 has been dispersed in grants since the program began. The cost for each child's registration is \$25/year and 33 children have registered to date.

The program seems to be well received and the Reminton Area Community Foundation is continuting to push this program through the local libraries and Remington School District.

Dolly Parton's Imagniation Library is administered through United Way of the Plans, Sedgwick County. Visit imaginationlibrary.com/check-availability to see if the program is available to residents in your zip code.


